Philosophy of Religion and Ethics and Religion are to some extent new topics to many of you, although you will be aware of elements of some of the aspects of study from your GCSE Religious Studies.



The *Philosophy of Religion* aspect will be very different from anything you have covered before and, in simple terms, it is the science of questioning and the answers scholars have explored regarding important issues throughout time.



Ethics and Religion will be more familiar - you will recognise some of the ethical issues from GCSE RE - although it will also examine what helps us decide on issues of human and animal life and death.

Background Recommendations

It is recommended that candidates will have achieved at least a grade 5 in Religious Studies at GCSE. As the course is heavily literacy based it is also recommended that candidates will have also achieved at least a grade 5 in English Language.

Skills Required

Candidates will be expected to 'read around' the topics covered and be prepared to work on essay writing and analytical skills, as well as questioning and debating skills.
